The German government is getting mad all over because the people of the United States disapprove of the release toward barbarism displayed in the outrageous persecutions of the Jews in Germany. It might be interesting to hear what they propose to do about it. The crusade has now taken the shape of overt violence, and the Jews are subjected to shameful indignities.

EX-SERATY THOMPSON explains that his acceptance of the presidency of the Panama canal company has no political bearing. He says that the controlling interest will be in America, and that there is no attempt to get a political foothold on this continent on the part of France. The whole scheme assumes the proportions of a purely private business transaction.

The new Chinese treaties have been received at Washington. They concede to the United States the right to limit, regulate or suspend the immigration of Chinese laborers, and the Chinese government demands such measures. This is a return, undertaken to restrain the opinion that the Chinese of the customs tariff is contemplated. In regard to limit, it is conceded that in all treaty ports mixed cases will be tried by the courts, and the federal's nationality, and the law administered will be that of the officer who tries the case.
