A City Charter. CURRENT TOPICS

One branch of the Legislature of Indiana has already passed a bill reducing the legal rate of interest to 6 per cent., which is the rate now in Pennsylvania, and is found to work well.

Recent scientific researches in Canada has led to the discovery of those skeletons of Indian graves in the vicinity of Toronto.
