Leon Hoode, J. C. Flynn, T. J. Hayes, J. D. Lachman, J. R. Steele, Russell Spinks, Joseph Fisher and Wm. McCall, returned from the A. O. U. W. hall at Brainerd by train this afternoon, and report having had a gratifying time.

A bill incorporating the independent school district of Brainerd passed both houses of the legislature this week under suspended rules. Its object is to exempt the district from the compulsory use of the Merrill text book, leaving the matter optional with the district.

A number of prominent citizens of Little Falls will attend the annual ball and banquet of the Brainerd lodge of the A. O. U. W. in Brainerd on next evening. We understand that Mayor Leon Hoode will be the featured speaker, and that J. P. Flynn will furnish the classical text necessary to give the proper tone to the affair. The Sheriff Hayes will be asked to keep order, and Russell Spinks to furnish the addressing episodes.

The joint legislative committee on appropriations yesterday changed the basis of representation previously agreed upon and announced by the "Tanner" last week. It has increased the number of senators to forty-six and the number of representatives to one hundred and fifty. It is expected that this change will be the addition of several representatives before the final adoption of a plan to be submitted to the house. So says a reliable source.

Little Falls and Dakota Railroad.
St. Paul, Feb. 18, 1899. The bill granting State swamp lands for the construction of the Little Falls & Dakota railroad passed the Senate today, and awaits the governor's signature, to become a law.

The Apportionment.
The apportionment calendar is still a boiling and seething lot of advice to be heeded, and the people are right. The congressional apportionment committee agreed yesterday upon a plan which constitutes a fair and equitable division of the south line of the State. Stevens, Pope, Stearns, Benton, Miller, Lacs, Knapp and Crockett are the congressional districts, with a population of 120,521 which is about 167,783 for the first, 168,833 for the second, 168,165 for the third, 148,424 for the fourth district, and so on.

In a measure the prospective rapid growth and development of the fourth portion of the state, and while it does not fully come up to the exigencies, is about all we can expect to expect under all the circumstances. The legislative apportionment has not yet been fully agreed upon, and will be pending in the legislature during the week. The counties of Crow Wing, Morrison, Todd, Benton and Sherburne were the first to be divided, and each district with one senator and three representatives. Todd county, with a population of 123,000, afterwards split apart as a separate representative district, with one representative, leaving the remainder of the district with a population of 123,000 and two representatives. This was receded again this morning and Sherburne taking the place of Todd and attached to Wright county and Miller Lacs put in its place leaving the representation as before one senator and three representatives. The latter to be elected at large.

This is a very respectable plan to Crow Wing county which is the best arrangement that can be prepared for our interests, and we hope it will be allowed to remain.
