Mr. GLASTON made the annual budget statement in the House of Commons recently. The gross revenue was \$242,350,000, or 6,718,000 more than the estimate. Mr. Gladstone proposes to make several important changes in the English revenue system during the coming year, among others the reduction of the duty on foreign beer, the augmentation of the duty on grain, the conversion of about 100,000 acres of longer ones, and the gradual reduction of the public debt, the reduction of the income tax by one penny on the pound sterling, the change of a portion of the surplus revenue to the construction of harbors, the gradual reduction of the duty on silver plate, the substitution for the duty on foreign liquors of a uniform duty of fourpence (eight cents) per gallon in standard proof, the change of the probate, legacies and succession duties. He estimates the expenditures of the coming year at \$248,550,000, which would leave a surplus of \$6,425,000. Comparing the present budget with that of Sir Stafford Northcote, four years ago, it appears that the revenue is larger by \$2,475,000, and the expenditures larger by the same amount, \$2,485,000. The chancellor of the exchequer, then, proposed no alterations in the taxation, saying that he did not find it necessary to add any taxes, and in consequence of the fact that a satisfactory state of affairs

was found to exist. The first step was taken to the Fort Scott White rail, which is to be completed in 1907.
