AN enterprise designed to counteract the enticements of liquor saloons has gone into operation at Boston under the name of the Poplar Street Club. The house contains music reading and bath-rooms, and refreshment rooms, where light eatables will be sold at cost. The rooms will be open from 10 o'clock P.M.

THE AGENTS for admission to the New York state bar, at Ithaca, recently, was Frank Wall, who was pardoned out of the state prison four years ago. He is now serving a sentence for the murder of his father, on the ground that his physical constitution had broken down. Through strong influence, soon after his imprisonment, he was transferred to the insane asylum on the ground of insanity.

HOPSEA-ARMER, who was sentenced to imprisonment for having translated the Bible into Turkish, and for having circulated it in the states of the Sultan, escaped from the prison at Chio, after an earthquake. The prison was thrown down by the violence of the shock, but Holscha-Armet was not hurt. He managed to get out of the Turkish vessel now in London.

Wm. Hamlin Hamlin, during whose public life the republic has grown from twenty-seven to thirty-eight states, and from a population of 16,000,000 to 60,000,000, is retiring his last day in the Senate, he writes to his son:

"I am sitting for the last day in the Senate, and my son is a happy man. You and yours may not comprehend it, but I sit in the highest of all offices. This is the day I long have sought."

That other veteran, not in congressional service, but in years of public usefulness, Allen C. Thurston, is leaving spending his last day at the senatorial desk and was near Hamlin, whose occupation at the moment he knew. Saying to a friend, "Old friend, I feel just as you do," he wrote upon a page of Hamlin's paper:

"My dear Mr. Hamlin, you have had the pleasure of my acquaintance, but I have never known you better than I do now. Like him, I can say in the last day of my public life, and I am now going out of this world to honor the last day of my friends of government. My sons wish to be made to honor the last day of my friends."

ON the Comptroller's papers of New York, George Stanley Matthews, in his columns this extract from Mr. Garfield's letter accepting the Chicago nomination: "The executive should, therefore, seek and win the support and assistance of those whose knowledge of the communities in which the duties are to be performed best qualifies them to select the wisest choice." The point is, of course, that in the appointment of Robertson the President has done exactly what the senatorial papers result out of the statements of New York, resident at Washington, and, therefore, is true to his promise. But the paragraph is not a mere platitude, and means that where the President is without personal knowledge of the character of applicants for office, which may often be the case, he will seek it from those who are in position to give information, not necessarily Senators and Representatives, in the case of the New York Custom House can hardly be considered an office local to New York, which is the port of entry for nine-tenths of the merchandise imported and brought to this country and distributed through its entire length and breadth.

Bernhardt Criticized. The champagne-critic of the world lives in Chicago. He published his claim to the position by telling the readers of the Gazette that a "jewelry hearse" was borne from the window-working fingers of a piano hanger.

Bernhardt's fort lies in storming her audience at the first charge. She accented you with her previous and gathering all the fire of her eld she produces an exclamation. That being accomplished the motions are captured and she brings them at her will. Her voice is monotonous and pathetic, possessing all the marks of the much refined operetta. A scarcely perceptible hum vibrates in the left eye from time to time, she glances that mysteriously side to the perfect voice of her husband. But it is in the final bow when all her efforts culminate in a flourish of the hand.

A Lively War Prospects. From May 10--W. A. Kiehn has been sent out in the United States district court here against Frank Higgins, president of the Northern Pacific railroad, for \$25,000, and has attached all of Higgins' lands in Cass and Richland counties, pending the action of the court.

RESIGNATION OF Senators Conkling and Platt, of New York. The resignation of the two New York United States Senators, reports of which are in the papers, have been heretofore from the center of the earth to its circumference, evidently created one of the greatest favors of excitement known in the history of this government.

On Tuesday noon the news was received in the senate at Albany, N. Y., of the confirmation of Mr. Robertson. This put on the finishing touch. A telegram from Washington on Wednesday evening reads as follows: "The agony, so far as Robertson is concerned, was ended to-day by his confirmation as collector of the port of New York. The operation was performed very skillfully by the vice president in executive session. The confirmation was made, and General Arthur declared him confirmed. Senator Beck seemed to be a little surprised because there was no fight among the republicans over the nomination, and he moved after the confirmation had been completed that the eyes and nose be called on the question. After some parleying he withdrew the motion and the speaker, who was seated at the executive mansion, Mr. Blaine was there, and also the attorney general. The victory had been won, and the republicans were triumphant. The principle of the right of the executive to appoint without the advice of the senators from the State in which the office to be filled is vacated, and the republican senators have resigned, making the senate democratic. There does not seem to be any great feeling of elation at the white house, though the president is serene, and so is Mr. Casper."

Salutes in honor of the confirmation of Robertson were fired in almost every town and hamlet throughout the state, and the wildest excitement prevailed. It was at first reported that neither Conkling nor Platt was a candidate for reelection, but they were contradicted. The outsiders in the senate chamber, when Robertson's confirmation was announced, were most enthusiastic demonstrators ever witnessed in such a place. It broke down the barrier of decorum, and the chamber fairly rang with applause and applause. Robertson was overrom, and afterwards said that in all his life he never before knew what it was to be popular. Immediately after this demonstration the anti-Conkling element seemed to swell into great proportions momentarily. It appeared to be the opinion of the floor-tiger of long pent-up feeling. There has been some talk of the senate refusing to go into an election to fill the vacancies, but the leaders of the anti-Conkling element at once declared that an election should take place; that the legislature should not adjourn until a choice is made, and that neither of the resigned senators should be returned. It now, they say, for the Conkling element to say when the election shall be held. They are ready, but the governor still withholds his notification. The action on his part has given rise to the suspicion that the Conkling element prefer not to go into an election with this legislature. Already names of candidates are mentioned, among them William A. Wheeler, William M. Everett, Sherman S. Rogers, Judge Folger, Warren Miller, Nathan C. Foster and Chas. M. Dewey. The democrats will undoubtedly elect Francis Kernan and ex-Gov. Lucius Robinson.

Conkling says nothing for publication as to his policy, but the fact that his resignation was announced in the evening of his confirmation and made a manly and pointed response. Other prominent characters followed and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed. The result must have been a surprise as well as a disappointment to Conkling, for it shows that following in the senate after all the bowling in which he had indulged, all senatorial privileges and the president's bad faith, is ridiculously small. The nearly unanimous vote must be accepted as substantially an emphatic censure of

the course Conkling and Platt have pursued in leaving their seats, and of the infamous assaults they and their organs have made upon the president. It often what appears to be very strong proof that in his conduct as member of the Republican party Mr. Conkling will find little support among leading adherents of that organization. Even the senators named as voting against Robertson will be likely to retreat precipitately from the position they have so foolishly taken as soon they understand what it really means. The advice from the capital of New York appears to be equally discouraging to the ex-sensitors. If the truth were known, it would perhaps appear that Conkling is about as much astonished as the country was on Monday afternoon.
