Perham, we gladly admit, is a prosperous town, led by business men full of energy, foresight and hope of which the "Times" need say no more. It is a central railroad point and division headquarters. A visit to that town has shown us that the manufacturing interests are fairly represented, within certain narrow limits. But the back bone of the nation, and in degree, of every town and city, is the agricultural interest. A visit to that town has shown us that the scattered farms, it may be, have by liberal expenditure of money been staffed with some miles of Brainerd and there the tale ends.

Perham has equally with Brainerd manufacturing interests. The saw mills of Messrs. Clarke & McClure are located here. It has a lumber yard which in size, quantity of equipment and quality of product ranks among the best in the state. Our new steam flouring mill is nearly completed, and with its elevator, now under way, will make many more of our merchants look well to their laurels or lose them. In addition, there is one of our merchants who is doing four times more in the village all pouring their products into our market place. A growing business in wagon and sleigh making is located here. We have the nucleus of a woolen mill, the collection of the "Perham Quill Whittier Pictures" in the north-west, which was recently on exhibition in the great agricultural car of the north-west, which made the noted eastern town, were certified to have been grown in Crow Wing county by the late A. **The Moral Tone of Brainerd.**
