**Our Present School System.**  
 In another column of this issue of the Times we have printed a communication from one of Brainerd's best citizens, calling attention to a few very pertinent remarks, to the loose and inadequate condition of our present school system. The Trustees received a few comments previously on this all important matter, but receiving so little encouragement, it had almost lost hope. But we desire to call special attention to the substance of this correspondence's remarks. Though, perhaps, a little pointed, they are none too much so. The shameful lack of attention given to vital concerns in this town is becoming almost unendurable to a portion of the community, and will last as long as it is a matter of positive LOCAL, EDUCATIONAL, and FINANCIAL INTEREST to any vicinity to be the fortunate possessor of good schools. It is, in fact, one of the commonest parts of a live town. It is not merely to live, and that alone that should constitute the ambition of a citizen who professes to have the welfare of his immediate vicinity at heart. Man, in his most degraded state, is human. Nothing in the power of the elements can change this definite fact. He is a part of the world, and he must act in his distinct character to the accomplishment of some positive benefit to his fellow citizens as to whether the aim shall center on a high or low object; but an individual endowed with the rights, privileges and benefits of an ambitious justice, will make his presence felt in a vicinity, sooner or later, no matter how much his inferior it may be. And should that period arrive when a sufficient kindred feeling shall have been cultivated within the minds of his fellow citizens, the parts of a live town, in general, to all, will surely result therefrom. The matter of allowing the educational facilities of a town of upwards of 4000 inhabitants to remain on a level with the other towns that of nearly all towns of less than four hundred souls, is shamefully ridiculous. It is an open and self-declaring disgrace to the town and its inhabitants. The grand trouble in Brainerd, for there is no use of doing these facts is this: Every body is waiting for some body else to go ahead. Now, why can not all go ahead—pull together in progressive and commensurable harmony, and telling results in the right direction will surely follow. In the first place a town organization should be in vogue. There is scarcely a way station of any respectability in a vicinity, north or south, that has its municipal organization, and business is transacted in a manly way, and not as loosely as it unavoidably must be in places of the size of our own Brainerd, where in the form of government whatever is observed. These are blunt words. But they are as true as the course of the sun, and none can truthfully gainsay them. To the certain knowledge of the Trustees, parties have come into Brainerd with the intention of locating, but with a view to location, where desirable facilities for the proper education of their children might be secured, have cast anchor at some other point, possibly much less preferable in some other particular point of view. And it will ever be thus just so long as matters are permitted to lag along in this way. At this point, we must not be inventive or many for "not finding time" to attend a school meeting. At the same time they are working directly contrary to their own private as well as public interests. The town should not sanction a condition of affairs which shall act directly detrimental to its own vital welfare. It is a nuisance, so to speak, to be continually bounding away at the men who should be foremost in every enterprise, soliciting attention of public spirit, to secure the accomplishment of any desired result. Speed the day when this state of lethargy shall be completely annihilated from our progressive community. With glittering prospects of promise before it, it is absurdly shameful to permit this condition of school affairs to continue thus. Instead of paying out several hundred dollars every year to foreign schools, let it be expended at home in fitting out the proper requirements for first-class educational equipments, and let Brainerd proudly show her head at the top of the crest.

**Annual School Meeting.**  
 The annual meeting of the voters of Special School District No. 1, of Brainerd, was held pursuant to notice in the public school building on Saturday evening, September 3d, 1881.  
 The president of the board being absent, P. M. Lagerqvist was voted to the chair, and the meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock.  
 The treasurer's report for the past school year was then read as follows:

 The meeting next proceeded to the nomination and election of two school directors for a term of three years. The names

of T. Bason, S. D. Mason, R. Relf, J. C. Congdon, I. U. White, Geo. Stevenson and Mr. Sunberg were presented.  
 T. Bason, S. D. Mason and R. Relf declined. Wm. Fairbank and E. B. Closson were appointed as tellers. Nineteen votes were cast. J. C. Congdon and I. U. White received the majority, and were therefore declared elected. The retiring members whose terms of office have expired are E. B. Closson and T. Bason.  
 An interesting discussion ensued relative to the question of the present overcrowded condition of the schools, many of our leading citizens taking part, and evincing a lively interest in the question, and all agreeing that it was a matter of vital importance, and requiring immediate attention. The general desire appears to be to erect immediately on the north side of the track, a building to accommodate the primary department, which, it was thought, would meet the requirements of the town until a building such as our rapidly growing community ought to possess can be erected, and which is in contemplation.  
 Considering the time it would necessarily take to call a public meeting and vote a special tax for the purpose of erecting a building, Mr. H. A. Towse stated that he or Mr. L. P. White would agree to put up a suitable building and rent it out, and turn in over to the school board at the annual cost.  
 On motion of Mr. Relf, the board of education were requested to make arrangements to hold a meeting with a view to accepting his offer and securing the building.  
 A request was also made to the board on motion of Mr. French to call a special meeting of the board, to be held within two weeks, for the purpose of voting a tax to purchase the necessary building.  
 There being no further business the meeting, on motion, adjourned. T. Bason, Clerk.

RAILROADS. Jay Gould is credited with owning or controlling 600,000 miles of railway, with a net of \$640,000,000.

The train will leave on September 12, at 7 p. m. carrying passengers in sleeping cars, and will be accompanied by Dr. Gledhill and other. WASHINGTON, Sept. 6.—The president was seen in the White House at 10 o'clock this morning.

Horrible Indian Massacre.

Reliable information comes from Tucson, Arizona, to the effect that Gen. Carr and his entire command were butchered by the Apaches, on the 29th of last month.

Three couriers have just now come into Camp Thomas and bring news that Gen. Carr and his command have all been massacred by White Mountain Indians, thirty-five miles from Camp Apache. There were 110 men and seven officers killed.

This morning's paper has received news that a few escaped from Carr's command at Cabin creek, which was forty miles west of Fort Apache. Those who escaped are fighting their way to Fort Apache but it is doubtful if they get in.

Then comes another rumor from Fort Grant. In substance as here given: All the long Indian runners have been coming into San Carlos agency with reports of a fight with Gen. Carr at Cabin creek, in which they say there were seven officers and about 100 men killed.

The following is given as the latest from official sources: "Fort Thomas, Sept. 2.—Lieut. Haskell, A. D. C., Fort Grant; No courier from Apache, but rumors through Indians that Carr's command were all killed.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 2.—At the down town office of the United States army no definite information has been received regarding the reported massacre of Gen. Carr and his command.

New York, Sept. 3.—Gen Hancock stated to-night that he had written as to the accuracy of the reported massacre of Gen. Carr and his men.

LAUREL.—The last advice indicates that Gen. Carr was not killed, but that Capt. Henley was one of the slain. The number of killed was evidently somewhat exaggerated.
