SERMON.
 By Dr. F. J. Hawley, D. D., on the
Death of President Garfield,
Delivered Sunday, Sept. 25, 1881.

His brilliant inauguration, give promise of during his administration. Also for the insecurity of life, and the frailty of all human hopes and aspirations! We believe our dear President could have had little expectation of so sudden a summons. Could we have more forcible illustration of the truth, "in the midst of life we are in death?"

I have no purpose—and certainly the present would be a very unfit occasion to indulge in it had I—do indulge in exaggerated praise and high wrought eulogium through pen, a thousand tongues, and the omnipotent news paper have sounded his praises and pronounced his eulogy in every conceivable strain and way; the telegraph brings messages of sympathy and respect from queens and princes, from pope and kings, and public bodies throughout the civilized world; everywhere hearts are filled with horror at the hideous crime that has darkened our land; Eulogy is not my forte yet it is but simple justice to say of the late President of the Republic that he was wise, pure and patriotic as any of the public men now upon the stage of public life. Nature has endowed him with excellent mental capacity, and he had cultivated it with great care and diligence. His knowledge of the institutions and history of our country was alike exact and profound. He had studied them not only in their details, but in their philosophy. He came, therefore, to the consideration of all measures of public policy with great advantages. Impressed with the conviction that our institutions, if administered as our fathers designed, contained every power necessary to secure individual liberty, and the public welfare, he was for keeping every department of the government within the limits prescribed by the constitution. It was his steadfast adherence to this principle that brought upon him the wrath of the assassin.

Like most of the distinguished men of our time, and exceptionally of our country, like most of those who have risen to the high plane of power and trust, like most men who stand at the head of dates in the various departments of life, whether, political, professional, literary, or other pursuit, like most of the men who in our day and country have made the lives of hundreds—like these men, James Abrahm Garfield was emphatically the author and architect of his own fortunes. He owed nothing to the factious aids or the accidental circumstances of birth or fortune. Under God he made his own fame and his own fortunes. With his own hands he cleared the rugged pathway which led him up to the entrance door of the temple of honor and renown, and made it known and honorable among men. With the advantage of a gifted mind, and with a resolute purpose to follow the great end of his being—the service God and his country by application and industry, by energy and perseverance, and an honest and honorable life of well doing, he formed his own character, and won his own distinction, and has left it a rich heritage to his children, and as an example to American youth who shall come after him.

Many such examples are found in all our history. We mention Abraham Lincoln—the man who crushed the rebel empire, our President, who under God saved his country and redeemed a race from the bondage of centuries, filling by the assassin's hand of treason, sending into the grave and to nation's tears, and amid the saddest of nations, willing, yet bearing with him to the Lamb more of the world's affection—more of its sympathies, and more of its honors than were ever before accorded to other man, or prince, or potentate of earth; and whose highest eulogium is spoken, like him whose memorial service we to-day observe, in the universal lamentation. And I will add the name of Chester A. Arthur, the humble farmer's boy, born in a log cabin in a secluded town on the Green Mountains of Vermont, who now to-day by the will of the American people and by a providential dispensation wields the power and challenges the homage of the first magistrate of the nation, and on whose will or word to-day, more than of any other living man, hang the destinies of this American Republic. These are great, illustrious examples. Our history is full of them. They are as season-lights along the dim and crowd pathway of human life. They are for instruction, for guidance, for inspiration, for encouragements to the coming generations of our youth.

The fact that this man wins for himself is that that he may do his own.

With President Garfield's intellectual endowments, were happily blessed the manifold afflictions of his life, and all at these were superadded the pure and holier graces of a Christian faith, and consistent Christian life. The loss of such a man and such a head, by violence, is a sad indeed a great loss to the nation, to the state and to society. But we have only to know that it is God's doing, and "be still" in the mournful dispensation, but as far as our feeble eyes can reach, we see nothing but judgment for our oft-afflicted Republic. In this second removal of our head by assassination. May a merciful God grant that it may be otherwise!

The sad particulars of this event the secular and religious press have made familiar to us all, day by day during all these long weeks. I would fain believe that they must have fastened themselves on every mind and deeply affected every heart of their consequences to our beloved country, we can know nothing of them as hidden behind the veil of the future, and no human sagacity can penetrate them. There may indeed be mercy in the mournful dispensation, but as far as our feeble eyes can reach, we see nothing but judgment for our oft-afflicted Republic. All his greatness of heart, matchless oratory, profound statesmanship, earnest sympathy for every good work, are all--at one fell swoop of the most miserable and damnable wretch on all the face of this earth laid low. It is dreadful to contemplate that in this land of free institutions, where a youth laboring in the woods or upon the towpath, may become president of the republic, yet he is not safe in a time of profound peace or of great excitement as is evidenced by the fates of Lincoln and Garfield, some devil will dare take his life. But if spared to serve out his term of office, he is only a common fellow-citizen.

Gen. Lucius F. Hubbard leads the ticket. SECRETARY KIRKWOOD will again accept the position of U. S. Senator, if elected by the legislature of his state.

We have not time to give the details of the State Convention but would say that its deliberations were harmonious, and a good ticket nominated.

A Sublime Spectacle.

There was naturally present in public thought a vague apprehension of some terrible thing which might ensue upon the death of the president. This fear was undefinable, but finds its basis in the history of other countries, where the change of rulers has often led to great political commotions, and not infrequently to revolution and anarchy. It is true our system of government has been subjected to shocks of that kind in former years, but however reassuring is the fact that our free institutions successfully withstood those shocks, there still lurked a dread of what might be some new phase of danger not yet developed. Three times had previous presidents died in office and three times had the constitutional provision for the perpetuation of the executive power been tested and proven adequate to each emergency, but so recent is history with the failure of other nations to hold over such breaks in the law--executing power of the government, that it was only human to anticipate the possibility of a like disaster befalling our own country. But again has the magnitude and virility of the power of a free people been derided and strangled. Not a discordant ripple broke the placidity of our system of government. Fifty millions of people were in anguish over the death of their chief executive, and deep feelings of anger and hatred stirred the popular breast at the thought of the miscreant who wrought all this woe and threw a dark pall over the republic. But while the deep waters of emotion surged in the hearts of the people there was not the faintest manifestation of any disturbance in the synchronization of our form of government. In America liberty is order, law is peace, and freedom is vested in the hearts of the people. The president is dead; the president lives. The form of liberty is liberty itself and the power of the people is the perpetuity of the government.

The effect of a change of presidents was as little perceptible in financial and commercial as in political circles. Speculators whose love of gain eclipses their patriotism had thought to take advantage of a depression in the prices of government bonds and other securities with a view to reaping large profits upon the advance in the near future. But to their surprise and just discomfort, there was no depression of values succeeding the death of President Garfield. The stability of our government and the unshaken faith of the financial and commercial world in the power and perpetuity of a government of the people by the people and for the people, was signally demonstrated in an actual advance in prices of government bonds and securities, as also of all the leading cereals. The great republic is founded on a basis so substantial that it is not to be shaken by the incidents of individual lives, it has the hope of perpetuity such as is guaranteed to no other nation on the face of the globe.

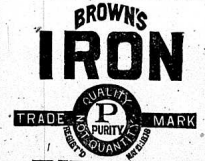
