 is hardly worth noticing, but in regard to de-
 cerning in court it might be well to say that at
 the conclusion of his court last September,
 Judge Stems openly complimented the sheriff
 upon the quiet and orderly behavior main-

 sufficient cause for her removal to St. Peter.

Don't fail to register. CHRISTMAS will not be observed with as much ceremony this year as usual. The new Chinese minister to Mexico, Chang Tiao Ju, has arrived at Washington accompanied by his wife and suite.

The rumor that Blaine is figuring for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1884, is too absurd for even passing attention.

SECRETARY FRILINGBYVEN, Blaine's successor, is admirably fitted for the position. He is essentially a man of affairs, prompt and practiced, and brings to his work a thoroughly cultivated mind.

VANDERBILT'S daughter, who was married in New York on Tuesday to Dr. William Stewart Webb, had the financial aspect of the matrimonial step made brighter by a check from her billionaire papa for a quarter of a million.

It is currently reported the difficulties existing between the Manitoba railroad management, and the striking boiler makers has been amicably adjusted. It will be a source of great rejoicing to the city of St. Paul should this be the case.

The way in Milwaukee for the possession of the Seal has assumed a sanguinary hue, the editorial force of that paper having armed themselves to the teeth and resolved to hold the journalistic fort. The matter is in the courts as well and public interest is greatly excited.

The exportation of breadstuffs for November as shown by the official report is not very encouraging. It has fallen off somewhat from last month and more from the corresponding month last year. For the eleven months ending November 30, the total exports were \$210,310,432, a falling off of about fifty millions.

We trust our business men will remember that it costs money to run a daily paper, and lend us their patronage to as full an extent as they consistently can afford to do. We shall endeavor to publish a live daily news paper, and to build up the interests of Brainerd and the surrounding community.

Monday is the last day granted the town clerk for posting the notices of the judges of election and the time and place where they will be in session for the correction of the registration list. It is also the last day for the judges to put up lists of the qualified voters in their respective wards, and it is to be hoped that none of these officers will neglect their duty.

A LACK of compositors has rendered it impossible to issue to our readers as much general reading matter as has been desired, but this deficiency will be overcome, it is to be hoped, as soon as additional help can be secured. At this period of the year it is an exceedingly difficult matter to obtain good printers at any price. The Tribune has, however, been exceedingly fortunate in securing first-class workmen, and with the aid of one or two more which we trust soon to obtain, everything will be in good running order.

ONE of the most important events in the history of Brainerd will take place on the 10th of January. On that day the first city election will be held and prior to that time every good citizen should give the matter his earnest and thoughtful attention. Brainerd has entered a new era—the town is now a city, and the importance of a right start in her municipal government cannot be overestimated. We have plenty of able and honest men who would perform the duties pertaining to any office within the gift of the citizens not only with honor to themselves but in a manner acceptable to their constituents. As no man is permitted to vote unless he has registered at least ten days before the election, all voters whose names are not already on the list are urged to be prompt in registering on the date which will be set to-day or Monday by the judges of election and duly announced by the town clerk.
