Boston has a novelty in the shape of a dramatic company composed of five blind students.

The Iowa legislature is considering the bill of Representative McDermott to prohibit the practice of treating.

Dr. Agnew has written to a member of the special committee on President Garfield's expenses, saying that he would in ordinary cases charge from \$25 to \$1,000 a visit.

William R. Taylor, the well known Wisconsin quarrier who was once governor of that state, has secured a divorce for desertion and incompatibility. He objected to being compelled to cook his own meals and make his own bed.

A company has been organized in Canada for the purpose of bringing over and establishing on government land in Manitoba colonies of persecuted Jews from Russia. A charter has been applied for, abundant capital is promised, and a large emigration from Russia to the northwest next summer is looked for.

Before the coroner's jury in the Spoyven Duval disaster the contortor testified in substance that more than half the legislators, assemblymen, etc., in the train were drunk, that bottles were passed around freely, and that in this opinion ruin was the cause of the accident, which would not have happened had not the air brakes been tampered with.

The statistics of twenty-one falling banks in New York show that the expenses of the receivers in paying \$4,000,000 over to depositors and other creditors amounted to about \$1,000,000, or twenty-five per cent of all funds coming into their hands.

Not one of these, however, was a national bank, but were, all local banks, doing business under the laws of the state of New York.

Underwood's Counterfeit Detector for January, containing the latest information regarding the "queer" is just out. It announces the appearance of a photographic counterfeit silver certificate of the denomination of \$20, reported from Missouri, No. 675,114. The counterfeit is much paler than the genuine. The Detector says: "We warn our subscribers to examine all silver certificates with great care, as the photographic process having been adopted in the production of counterfeits on them, no doubt many counterfeits will be put into circulation. The arrest of a man in Memphis, Tenn., with \$300 in counterfeit silver certificates of the denomination of \$10 and \$20 in his possession, is just reported at the secret service office in Washington."

At last the nauseating trial of the canting and disgusting Guffeau has reached a fitting end, and the cold-blooded murderer of our martyred president has been found guilty and responsible for his dastardly deed. Ten minutes was occupied by the jury in arriving formally at the verdict, and when the news flew over the country on the swift wings of electricity, there was great rejoicing in every city, and tears and people were loud in their expression of joy, and everyone felt a profound relief at the just settlement of the case. Every right-minded and patriotic citizen has for months felt the deepest anxiety at the outcome of the great trial, and though there were those who felt that the verdict was a verdict ought to be rendered, it was recognized that the colossal audacity of the criminal might influence the opinion of the jury in regard to his liability. Of course a heavy trial will be asked, but it is hardly probable that it will be granted.

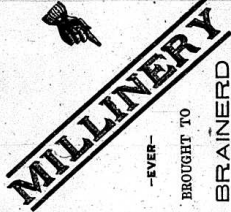
