The Coming Election. The political outlook at present has not yet assumed that crisis that usually characterizes the Brainerd municipal elections, although there are numerous claims that will be captured before the day arrives.

C. H. Douglas and W. W. Hartley until Monday were the only avowed candidates for the position of mayor, but on that evening at a meeting of the working-men F. G. Sundberg was nominated as their candidate.

This and a different set of things Mr. Sundberg is known to be in direct opposition to the saloon interests and has so expressed himself openly, and when the candidacy was placed before the people there was a general hunting of dry bones.

Mr. Sundberg is a Scandinavian member of a very strong organization composed of gentlemen of that nationality, the Society Month, but it is claimed that his Scandinavian brethren who are in the saloon business are working hard against him, and that he will not receive a very solid support from them.

He is well posted and has a thorough knowledge of the workings of municipalities, but he is the proprietor of the Villard Hotel, and of course causes a bolt of the temperance people who would otherwise turn in and support him.

It is a puzzle to the majority of our people, since Mr. Sundberg came up, as to who stands the best show, even more so than the famous "punch" but his heads figure it out that Mr. Sundberg will draw from Mr. Hartley, and that C. H. Douglas will probably capture the plum. Do you give your money until you hear the returns.

Wisconsin's Biggest Pension. WASHINGTON, March 31.—Probably the largest pension certificate ever granted to a Wisconsin retiree was one allowed by the commission on pensions to-day to Peter Schumaker, who was a private in the 10th Wisconsin cavalry.

Schumaker is a pensioner at the rate of \$72 per month. The arrears allowed amounted to \$12,500. The pension is payable at the Milwaukee agency, and it is said will be the largest amount ever paid to any one pensioner by that agency.

Schumaker has been an inmate of the St. Joseph hospital for the last two years, and is nearly blind. He was injured by a fall from a horse in 1864, and has since that time been unable to do any work.
