AGRICULTURAL.

New Apples Wanted. Much attention has been given of late years to raising new grapes, new strawberries, new pears, and other sorts of fruit, but why is the apple so nearly neglected? Fattening Fowls.

A TRAGIC AFFAIR.

Three Lives Lost by Inhabiting Ponds. A writer from Adamsville, Ohio, to the Cincinnati Commercial, under date of August 4, says: "The saddest calamity that ever happened in this community occurred yesterday afternoon between 1 and 9 o'clock, about two miles southwest of this place. Mr. A. V. Wise has a well that has been about dry, and about thirty-five feet deep. For several days he has been digging it deeper, and a windlass and tub for drawing out the dirt stood over the mouth of the well. Her father, as soon as the accident was known, came out and let his son down to bring her up. He had hardly reached the bottom before he became insensible from the foul or damp air. No other help being near, Mr. Wise raised an alarm by ringing long on the neighbors, and came in from all quarters. Among the first there was a young man named Winfield Hanks. Without stopping to inquire about the condition of the well, he was let down with a rope to bring up one of the bodies, and while engaged in this work he became insensible. A Visit to an Iceberg.

A correspondent of the Waterbury (Conn.) American, writing on board the United States steamer Junonia, at St. John's, N. F., July 7th, writes: "On the 3d instant a large iceberg became stranded at the mouth of the harbor, and the captain wishing some of the officers to go out with him and see it, I gladly accepted the invitation, and as soon as our party was made up, we started in our launch. As the iceberg approached the berg the air grew sensibly colder, and we found it necessary to slip on our overcoats. We ran alongside of it and measured it with our eyes, which gave us 35 feet high, 100 feet broad, and 400 feet long. The top of the iceberg below the surface bears the proportion of seven to one we can calculate the depth or thickness of the berg to be 280 feet, equal to 11,200,000 cubic feet, or 286,225 tons. The berg was melting so rapidly, that water was flowing in every direction, preventing us from reaching it, and so we decided to go to a smaller one, and cut some ice for our own consumption. We were very successful, as we brought on board in the neighborhood of half a ton. About five minutes after leaving the large berg we struck an explosion, and looking around, saw that one of our bergs had burst off, and filled an area about three hundred feet in length of the width of the berg, so we escaped an unpleasant dampness just in time."

### Progress of the Northern Pacific.

In little more than twenty-four months of working time, the Northern Pacific Railroad Company has accomplished the following results:

1. It has built and opened to business more than 500 miles of its line of Road, besides an additional section of one hundred miles put under contract and now being constructed.

2. It has completed the entire Eastern Division of its Road, uniting the commerce of the Lakes with the navigation of the Upper Missouri, and has formed favorable connections with lines of steamers eastward from Duluth to Buffalo, Erie and Cleveland, and westward from Bismarck (where the road strikes the Missouri) to Fort Benton in Western Montana, thus opening a new and direct east and west route of travel and transportation 2,500 miles in length by lake, rail and river, between the Atlantic States and the New Northwest.

3. It has secured—by reason of the shortness and directness of its line—the trade of the Northwest, including the transportation of Army and Indian supplies.

4. It has earned title to nearly ten million acres of the lands granted by the Government to aid in the construction of the road, and these consist mainly of good prairie, farm and grazing lands in Central Minnesota and Dakota, and valuable timber lands about Puget Sound.

5. It has fully organized its Land and Emigration Department, and successfully begun the work of selling and settling its land grant. It has realized from lands thus far sold an average price of nearly six dollars per acre, and from the proceeds has already begun the purchase and cancellation of its 7-35 first mortgage bonds.

6. It has opened to the landless citizens of this and other countries, and to the markets of the world, 200,000 square miles of the grain belt of the continent, from which the bulk of the wheat export of the United States must, ere long, be drawn.

The work of construction is progressing satisfactorily, mainly in Washington Territory, where the connection is being completed between Puget Sound and the Columbia River. The Company's engineers, escorted by U. S. troops, are now making a final location of the line of the road from the crossing of the Missouri to the crossing of the Yellowstone, and up the valley of the latter to the mountains—this being the only portion of the route not yet determined.
