It's Birth, and the Various Stages Thereof; and How it Launches Out into the World—Where it is Sure to Return, Like a New Prodigal, Wofully Bedraggled and Worn, to the Place of Redemption.

[Washington Letter to the Inter-Ocean.] Probably not one person in a thousand has any idea of the origin and fate of a thing they handle or see daily—a national bank note—

HOW IT COMES INTO THE WORLD. The paper on which bank notes are printed is manufactured by two Pennsylvania firms, and has none of the distinctive qualities of the fiber paper used for legal tenders.

Let it be stated now, and remembered throughout the whole of this description, to save repetition, that every note is counted at least twice by every person who handles it, when he receives it, and when he delivers it.

THE CHIEF DEPOSIT OF THE MONEY THAT EVIDENTLY ACCUMULATES WITH THE AGENT IS VAULT IN THE SECOND STORY, ACCESSIBLE ONLY BY A LITTLE GALLERY RUNNING AROUND THE MARBLE CASH ROOM.

One branch of this work deserves more extensive notice than could be allowed it in its proper place, the receiving of teller's receipts, namely, detection of counterfeiters, and detection of lookers, but their detection devolves especially on the first counters, who are peculiarly responsible for any subsequently found in bundles bearing their initials.

HOW IT GOES OUT OF IT.

An act passed June 30, 1874, providing that national bank notes should be redeemed in United States notes to the sender, and that to reimburse the government for such redemption each bank should keep on deposit in the treasury of the United States notes equal to 5 per cent of the deposit.

THE NATIONAL BANK REDEMPTION AGENCY. The agency occupies the rooms on the first floor along the north half of the western facade of the Treasury Department.
