### SUMMARY OF TREGREEAL NEWS.

The new court house at -Rockford, Ill., The new court house at -Rockford, Ill., fell with a crash on the 11th inst. Between twenty and twenty five workmen were carried down with the falling building and buried in the debris. Twelve were taken out dead and dying, and many of the wounded cannot live. 


